### PROWG Meeting

The Public Rights of Way & Greens committee is next meeting on Monday 20th February 2012 at 2pm. The papers for the meeting are now on the website at:

The committee will be making a decision on the Town Green application for Filwood Park. It will also be considering a revised procedure for considering Town Green applications following the consultation last year. The papers also include an update on other Town Green applications. The application for Grove wood will be considered at a future meeting.

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### Public Statements to BCC

You may have noticed that the public statements to last month's Cabinet and Full Council meetings have not appeared on the BCC website. This is due to the policy being changed by the Council's Democratic Services officers, apparently on the advice of the Data Protection Officer and following complaints that names and addresses of those who have made statements in the past can still be obtained through Google and other internet search engines.

It seems that Councillors have been told about this change of policy by email but were not involved in making the decision. The BPF committee have raised concerns that not publishing statements on the website (which Councillors claim to have taken into account in coming to decisions) is making the democratic process less transparent. It could also be seen as suppressing criticism of the Council. There may of course be legitimate reasons why some people would not want their contact details published and it would be wrong if they were put off making statements because they thought that would happen, but it must be possible to put a system in place that allows for that possibility.

Cllr Jon Rogers has said that he will raise this issue with his Cabinet colleagues and get back to us.

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### Litter Picking Day

I have received a couple of emails asking for clarification about what we are proposing for the litter picking day. The idea was for groups to organise events in their own park, but if there is somewhere else in your area that your group thinks needs a litter pick then that would be fine. Alternatively if there is some other clean up type task that needs doing then that would also work eg painting, fence repairs, bench repairs - you would obviously have to find funds from somewhere for any materials. The main idea is to promote parks and park groups.

We are suggesting the weekend of the 19th & 20th May, please let me know if you would like to join in.

### Green Space Disposals

The March round of Neighbourhood Partnership meetings are being asked to make decisions on green space disposals. It is actually the Neighbourhood Committees that will make the decision.

The meeting dates can be seen at <https://www.bristol.gov.uk/CommitteeMeetingFinder> and the details for the meetings will have the reports that list the decisions to be made. Of course some NPs such as Ashley, Easton and Lawrence Hill which do not have much green space do not have any spaces listed for disposal.

The others will follow over the next couple of weeks.

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### Site Allocations

The next phase of the Site Allocations consultation, the Preferred Approach consultation, will be published on 23 March 2012 and will be open for comment for eight weeks. This is the maps that were last consulted on at the same time as the Area Green Space Plans. The Site Allocations both lists sites for possible development and allocates land to particular uses in planning terms.

One of the issues that the BPF committee has raised in the past is that all parks and green spaces that are covered by the P&GSS and that are finally listed to be retained should also be allocated as important green space on the Site Allocations maps. This will give these spaces some protection in the future even if a future administration (or Mayor?) decides to go back to the way things were done before the P&GSS was adopted and tries to sell off spaces one at a time for development.

We are pleased to see in the reports on disposals the following statement:

"If sites are not declared surplus, and still required for recreational purposes, it is expected they will be designated as Important Open Space in the Site Allocations and Development Management, Development Plan Document (DPD)."

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#### PROWG Meeting

One of the spaces sold off by the Council before the P&GSS was adopted in February 2008 was Filwood Park. As expected the PROWG last week (20th Feb) agreed with the Inspector's recommendation that the application for a Town Green for Filwood should be rejected.

The PROWG also considered the revised procedure for deciding on Town Greens following the consultation last year. The BPF committee issued a public statement on this and I am pleased to say that the committee accepted our suggestions for changes. Probably the most important issue is that the procedure makes clear that all TG decisions involving land owned by BCC will be decided by an independent inspector.
