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### Keep Britain Tidy saves Love Parks Week

Keep Britain Tidy is proud to announce we have taken ownership of the flagship campaign 'Love Parks Week'.

We took the decision to save the popular campaign following the news in March that national parks charity GreenSpace had been forced to close due to funding cuts.

We are delighted to confirm ownership has now been secured ahead of this year's Love Parks Week, which runs from July 27 until August 4.

Excitingly, it is also our intention to use Love Parks Week as the launch pad for building a new coalition of key partners to develop the week of action and, beyond this, build it into a year-round 'Love Parks' campaign.

The partnership is in its infancy, but it is likely to include Groundwork, the Federation of City Farms and Community Gardens, as well as partner organisations in Wales, Scotland and Northern Ireland.

By bringing together Love Parks Week and the Green Flag Award programme within Keep Britain Tidy, our goal is to encourage millions more people to visit, enjoy and take pride in their local parks and green space.

Despite the tight timescale to deliver this year's campaign, it is our hope Love Parks Week will be another huge success, encouraging hundreds of thousands of people to celebrate the country's fantastic green spaces.

We need your help to achieve this.

We are currently still in the process of finalising the hand-over, but we expect this to be completed very soon. While we would please ask for your patience in the short-term, we will be in touch as soon as this is done and, once completed, we would urge you to please upload all your events to the website as usual.

It is our intention to make Love Parks Week bigger and better than ever by also announcing all the winners of Green Flag Awards during the same week. So please feel free to plan all your flag-raising events during the Love Parks Week.

While it's still early days, we believe Love Parks will be a rallying call to bring the sector together in the face of substantial budget cuts and threats to park services so that we can all continue to demonstrate just how valuable our parks and green spaces really are.

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### Himalayan Balsam

Hopefully you know all about this invasive weed. It can be defeated by repeatedly pulling it up before it has chance to spread its seeds.

But there are two sites in Bristol where it should be left to grow this year; these are in Blaise Castle Estate and Eastwood Farm. This is because of a project investigating the impact of this alien plant on native foodwebs. The question is whether as well as out-competing native plants for space it also attracts pollinating insects to the extent that native plants don't get pollinated.
